Definition of U.S. Beef

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supported Country of Origin Labeling and the definition of U.S. Beef defined in the 2008 Farm Bill; and

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports U.S. cattle producers,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports directing Federal Safety Inspection Service (FSIS) to clearly define U.S. Beef as only beef born, raised, and harvested in the United States (U.S.).

**Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas Policy
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Chronic Wasting Disease in Texas

WHEREAS, Chronic Wasting has been diagnosed in the Texas deer herd, primarily in captive deer breeding herds; and

WHEREAS, Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Texas Animal Health Commission have jointly set rules for the testing and transportation of captive deer; and

WHEREAS, there exists many different expert opinions on the modes of testing and the severity of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Texas deer breeders have very large monetary investments in the affected captive deer breeding herds and the remuneration for deer euthanized for testing purposes is minimal,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas recommends that the Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Animal Health Commission utilize the best available scientific information and only rely on state-of-the-art testing methods to effectively control Chronic Wasting Disease in the Texas deer herd.

Animal Welfare

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas believes that all livestock should be treated humanely; and

WHEREAS, many animal activist groups have adopted animal rights agendas that are designed to destroy the livestock industry; and

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas supports existing state laws that address animal cruelty that are in concert with existing industry accepted practices of handling and caring for livestock and do not interfere with the normal handling and care of livestock,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas recognizes that livestock are part of the human food chain and that livestock do not have individual rights and are not subject to treatment equivalent to human rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas urges state agencies to adopt policy that sets approved, rational, statewide animal care and handling policy based on the recommendations of existing livestock industry associations and not self-appointed animal rights activists.

National Animal Identification System

WHEREAS, the National Animal Identification System (NAIS) is a program mandated by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to: identify livestock producers, their premises and the premises where the livestock may be handled, managed, housed, or processed; to tag livestock or livestock groups with an identifiable numbering system; and to provide for the recording and storage of animal movement data; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this program is to provide the necessary infrastructure to identify, monitor, control, and eradicate animal diseases, thus providing a framework for state and national animal health emergency response actions; and

WHEREAS, USDA has failed to follow the recommendations of the National Animal ID Working Group, a group which includes, among others, the heads of state and tribal animal health commissions, all of whom are officials charged with the health and safety of livestock in their respective jurisdictions,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) has therefore developed this formal position statement in order to serve the interest of our membership on this critical issue.

We strongly believe in maintaining the health of the U.S. cattle herd. To assist in this goal, we support a voluntary NAIS with the purpose of developing a workable system that will satisfy animal health needs and not place undue burden on our producer members. To that end the system must be reliable, confidential, cost efficient, and meet the required health and safety requirements of NAIS.

1. We believe the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) should solely be in charge of administering the voluntary NAIS program with the responsibilities of collecting, storing, and managing the data for the State of Texas. We believe each state or tribal entity should maintain their individual data collection and storage systems.
2. We believe access to the data should be restricted to authorized TAHC and USDA personnel and limited specifically to bio-security and disease issues and animal health assurance. Furthermore, we believe NAIS should not be used to determine producer civil liability. ICA supports passing legislation that exempts all information in NAIS from the Freedom of Information Act.
3. Under no circumstances should any portion of the NAIS program be made mandatory before Congress has appropriated the necessary funds to assure that no undue burden is placed on any segment of the livestock industry to include producers, livestock marketing agents, or related entities.

4. The cost of all NAIS tags should be funded by the USDA and supplied at no cost to the producers and livestock marketing agents under the guidance of the TAHC in the state of Texas. In addition, livestock marketing agents should not be required to apply NAIS tags to livestock without fair remuneration. Neither Congress nor USDA should impose unfunded NAIS mandates on producers.
5. All stakeholders and interested parties may participate directly in the design, but should be restrained from participating directly in the administration or implementation of the NAIS program so as to avoid a conflict or perceived conflict of interest.
6. We do not support federally mandated, third party, private database programs. Animal health and safety data is of utmost importance and must be administered by the TAHC.
7. We oppose any provision of NAIS rules that would require tracking of animals within a premise or would require tagging of animals before leaving a premise.
8. We believe all livestock and livestock products that are in compliance with the NAIS rules should be readily identified by country of origin.

WHEREAS, the health of the U.S. cattle herd is vital to the profitability of independent cattle producers; and

WHEREAS, the US agricultural health and safety programs were established to protect the domestic agricultural industry and present a line of defense for foreign animal and plant diseases,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas opposes efforts by the government of the United States to allow regionalization of foreign countries with animal disease problems if such regionalization weakens animal health or food safety standards concerning importation of cattle or beef into the United States.

Trichomoniasis Testing

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas recognizes the need for increased health standards for livestock; and

WHEREAS, Trichomoniasis has become an increasingly prevalent disease in Texas and other western states; and

WHEREAS, many breeding age bulls imported into Texas originate from states experiencing outbreaks of Trichomoniasis,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas supports the Texas Animal Health Commission adopting regulations requiring all breeding age bulls to be tested for Trichomoniasis prior to importation into Texas.

Black Headed Mexican Buzzards

WHEREAS, the well-being of many bird flocks in the State of Texas are protected by both state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, a species among these, commonly referred to as the Black Headed Mexican Buzzard; and

WHEREAS, these carrion consuming carnivores do provide in some ways a public service by consuming carcasses of dead animals, however, the overly aggressive nature of the Mexican Buzzard often directs them to weak, newborn, or defenseless animals prior to death. This attack causes distress among the animal's mother and many times causes the defenseless animals death; and

WHEREAS, this attack on defenseless animals impacts the economic well-being of animal owners across the state,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas supports the adopting of policy by state and federal officials who will allow animal owners to deal with this pest.

Control of Black Flies

WHEREAS, the rivers and streams of the State of Texas are subject to many state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, there is reemerging in Northeast Texas and other parts of the state an insect species commonly referred to as “black flies” (i.e. Turkey Gnats, Buffalo Gnats), which cause considerable economic impact on cattle herds, horses, mules, poultry flocks, wildlife as well as people. These pests also impact industrial plants and cause general discomfort among the populations with which they come in contact; and

WHEREAS, one individual or group of individuals alone would have little or no opportunity to significantly curtail the activities of this pest as they appear across the state,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports the adopting of policy and the conducting of research by federal and state governments to better understand and bring about the control of these unwanted pests.

Tuberculosis Eradication Effort

WHEREAS, the state of Texas has been downgraded from its tuberculosis accredited-free status to one of modified accredited advanced; and

WHEREAS, such action will require more stringent oversight and/or regulation of the cattle industry; and

WHEREAS, Texas has the majority of cow/calf operations in the United States,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) supports an eradication effort that is based on sound science that would have the least adverse effect on the Texas cattle industry.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA favors zoning or regionalization eradication efforts and stronger surveillance at our ports of entry. ICA also supports identifying cattle leaving the state by way of a specific brand or unique ear tag, rather than implementation of a statewide tuberculosis-testing program.

Global Foot and Mouth Disease Situation

WHEREAS, Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) is currently plaguing many parts of the world, especially Europe and the economic and emotional toll of the disease is devastating to animals, individuals and governments; and

WHEREAS, FMD is a highly contagious disease that can spread very rapidly among a wide variety of cloven hoof animals; and

WHEREAS, the Texas cattle handling and processing system is complex and sophisticated which cares for, markets, transports and processes hundreds of thousands of cattle on a daily basis,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) calls on the State of Texas, the Federal government and all livestock producers in Texas to take all precautions within their respective powers to prevent this disastrous disease from entering the United States.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA urges both the State of Texas and the Federal government to work closely to develop the most effective emergency contingency plan possible in the event an outbreak of FMD occurs and that critical elements of such plan needing special attention include timely payment of livestock depopulated, strict enforcement of quarantines and the most effective public awareness program possible.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas urges state and federal governments working on such plans to establish priority lines of communication with Texas livestock producers in the event of an outbreak of FMD.

Animal Law Specialty

WHEREAS, the civil and criminal court system in the United States is backlogged with a heavy caseload; and

WHEREAS, many of the cases are trivial in nature and serve to slow the judicial process; and

WHEREAS, animal rights activists have long used the Federal and State court system to promote their agenda; and

WHEREAS, several of the nation's law schools have been encouraged to include animal law as a legal specialty; and

WHEREAS, the State Bar of Texas has formed the State Bar Animal Law Section; and

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) is concerned that challenges from this section could negatively impact research, medical research, veterinary medicine practices as well as livestock handling practices,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas strongly believes that animals need to be treated humanely, however providing them equivalent legal rights as humans is stretching legal boundaries too far.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA advocates the use of common sense and reality and asks the State Bar of Texas to monitor animal rights activities closely.

Treatment and Disposition of Animals

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports amending Title 10 Health and Safety of Animals, Chapter 821 Treatment and Disposition of Animals, Subchapter A Treatment of Animals of the Texas Agriculture Code; and

WHEREAS, the current rules are unfair to livestock owners who may be the target of animal rights groups attempting to gain publicity and create a dismal depiction of normal livestock practices; and

THEREFORE, the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports adding the following rule changes to the Texas Agriculture Code, Sec. 821.022 a. the investigating officer will ascertain all owners of the animal(s) and determine any and all lien holders, prior to presenting an application for warrant to the magistrate. Each owner and/or lien holder must be notified in writing by return receipt mail prior to issuance of warrant. Upon receipt of a complaint the magistrate shall cause an unbiased veterinarian, not associated with any parties to the action, and appropriate with the animal practice, to inspect all affected animals and provide a written diagnosis report to the magistrate, prior to warrant issuance. And,

THEREFORE, the Independent Cattlemen’s Association also supports the following changes to Sec. 023 a.1 that prima facia evidence be limited to only the proven mistreated animals; not all animals in possession at the time of magistrates ruling.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas urges the Texas Legislation to immediately create and pass legislation to adequately protect livestock owners from the rules which unfairly treat livestock owners facing animal cruelty proceedings.

State Beef Council Fund Allocation

WHEREAS, Qualified State Beef Councils may direct that a portion of their funds be forwarded for use in national Checkoff programs; and

WHEREAS, the Cattlemen’s Beef Board (CBB) is presently authorized to receive such funds from State Beef Councils; and

WHEREAS, the CBB provides oversight and recommendations for distribution of all national Checkoff funds and is the mandated funding conduit for national Checkoff dollars; and

WHEREAS, the Beef Checkoff Operating Committee, which is composed of both CBB and Federation of State Beef Council members, is charged with considering budget recommendations proposed by the CBB and with the awarding of national Checkoff contracts funded by national Checkoff dollars,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas urges that all State Beef Council funds forwarded for use by the national Checkoff program should be forwarded to the CBB and awarded by the Beef Checkoff Operating Committee, in a like manner as the national Checkoff monies expended by the Cattlemen’s Beef Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that State Beef Councils at their direction be allowed to earmark such funds to certain specific programs.

**Checkoff Improvement-Promotion of
U.S. Born and Raised Beef**

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) has been a leader in the promotion of Country of Origin Labeling (COOL), its approval in the 2002 Farm Bill, and subsequent improvement and implementation in the 2008 Farm Bill; and

WHEREAS, ICA recognizes that COOL is a marketing tool and not a food safety issue as determined by USDA; and

WHEREAS, when COOL is fully implemented, producers will have two beef marketing programs, the Beef Checkoff and COOL, with which to promote beef; and

WHEREAS, ICA believes that the Beef Checkoff program, which is funded primarily by U.S. producers, whose cattle are solely U.S. born and raised, should promote their product, U.S. beef,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ICA supports the promotion of U.S. born and raised beef as identified thru COOL, utilizing Beef Checkoff dollars, thus combining the complimentary parts of both programs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA believes that by promoting U.S. beef in the market case, U.S. producers will be better able to see their Checkoff dollars working for them.

Checkoff Improvement-Public Market Reimbursement

WHEREAS, for over twenty-two years public livestock markets have collected and forwarded checkoff dollars to qualified state beef councils in support of the beef checkoff; and

WHEREAS, during this period of time public livestock markets have provided this service for cattle producers and the checkoff without remuneration for their expense; and

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas, (ICA) considers the present arrangement established under the 1986 Beef Promotion and Research Act and Order and mandated upon livestock markets to be an unfunded and therefore unfair mandate,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ICA supports reimbursing public livestock markets (in a manner similar to other checkoff contractors) for their administration expenses incurred in the collection, record keeping, and forwarding of checkoff funds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA supports the allotment of ten (10) per cent of any Checkoff assessment increase approved by a vote of cattle producers to be retained by the owners of livestock markets that collect and forward Checkoff assessments to qualified state beef councils in order to defray administrative costs of collection.

Checkoff Improvement-Assessment Exemption

WHEREAS, The Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas (ICA) supports a strong and effective Checkoff for the purposes of research, safety, and the promotion of beef; and

WHEREAS, ICA believes that the checkoff should be assessed fairly, should benefit all producers, and should not be a burden to any producer or class of producers,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ICA supports exempting the sale of animals valued at twenty-five dollars (25.00) or less from the collection of the checkoff assessment.

Checkoff Assessment Increase

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) has represented cattle producers in Texas since 1974, ICA members support a strong Beef Checkoff program that promotes beef and utilizes our Checkoff dollars wisely. ICA believes the Beef Checkoff program should be a producer-driven program controlled and directed by all of the participants. As an association, ICA has supported the Checkoff since its inception and remains committed to promoting our products and educating consumers; and

WHEREAS, research conducted using checkoff dollars (during the 22 years that the beef checkoff has been in existence) has provided invaluable information and resources in the areas of human health and nutrition, beef safety, beef quality assurance, developing new cuts and new uses for beef, defending the industry against false and unwarranted attacks and criticism, and defense, mitigation and protection against foreign animal disease threats; and

WHEREAS, in the same 22 years, the costs involved in conducting research, development, and promotion have increased, the value purchased by each checkoff dollar has decreased, and the total number of checkoff dollars has steadily decreased. Not only are there substantially less dollars in terms of real value now compared to 1986, but valuable research, development, and promotion goes unfunded, putting beef at a disadvantage compared to the competition,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports an increase in the checkoff assessment to two (2) dollars or an amount decided by producers who pay the assessment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA supports the creation of a mechanism for future increases in the assessment but also is adamant that a present increase or future increases be subject to and contingent upon the successful vote of those who pay the assessment. No increase should be implemented without the consent of cattle producers.

Checkoff Improvements-Referendum, Contractors, Independence

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) has represented cattle producers in Texas since 1974 and ICA members support a strong Beef Checkoff program that promotes beef and utilizes our Checkoff dollars wisely; and

WHEREAS, ICA believes the Beef Checkoff program should be producer-driven, controlled and directed by all of the participants. ICA has supported the Beef Checkoff since its inception and remains committed to promoting our products and educating consumers; and

WHEREAS, ICA supports a future Beef Checkoff plan that addresses the inequities in the present system, that insures that producer funds are utilized efficiently and as intended and that the contracting process is transparent, conducted at arm's length from all contractors and is easy to understand by all producers; and

WHEREAS, the per capita beef consumption in the United States has ceased to decline according to Texas Beef Council statistics while ranchers expenses have continued to increase and the packer and retailer portions of the beef dollar, taken as a percentage of gross beef revenue have continued to rise based on industry reporting during the same time period,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that cattle producers who are the primary financial contributors of Beef Checkoff funds, should be the ultimate income beneficiaries of increased beef demand spurred by Checkoff dollars.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that deficiencies in the present system need to be addressed and ICA believes that the Beef Checkoff program would be much more effective and result in a greater return to the producer if the following recommendations are instituted:

1. Conduct a referendum every ten years to determine if producers wish to continue the Checkoff and prior to each ten year referendum conduct an unbiased, third party analysis that measures the effectiveness of the Checkoff program. In addition, producers should continue to have the option to petition for a referendum in the interim between ten year required referendums.
2. Require that the opportunity to contract for Beef Checkoff dollars be open to all contractors to allow for increased competitiveness in the bidding process.
3. Terminate contractor participation in all Checkoff functions such as governance, leadership selection, administration (except for execution of contracts), advisement and contracting selection, so that the contracting process is

transparent, understandable, at arm’s length from all contractors, and so that the financial trail of Checkoff funds is easily traceable by all parties.

- a. Remove the Federation of State Beef Councils from NCBA. (This is a prime example of an organization, FSBC, involved in the Checkoff fund contracting process that is not at arm’s length with a primary contractor, NCBA.)
- b. Require the Cattlemen’s Beef Board to meet separately from NCBA and all other policy driven and/or contracting organizations (again this is an example of an organization, CBB, that recommends and provides input for Beef Checkoff contracts that is not at arm’s length with a primary contractor, NCBA.)
- c. Remove all policy representatives from joint Checkoff committees and make the representation on those committees reflect the makeup of the Checkoff Operating Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas supports the present Beef Checkoff system and does heartily endorse the above recommended changes.

Revisions to the Beef Checkoff Program

WHEREAS, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) has represented cattle producers in Texas since 1974 and ICA members support a strong Beef Checkoff program that promotes beef and utilizes our Checkoff dollars wisely; and

WHEREAS, ICA believes the Beef Checkoff program should be a producer-driven program controlled and directed by all of the participants and ICA has supported the Checkoff since its inception and remains committed to promoting our products and educating consumers; and

WHEREAS, ICA supports a future plan that addresses the inequities in the present system, in which producers must be assured that their funds are utilized efficiently and as intended; and

WHEREAS, the per capita beef consumption in the United States has ceased to decline according to Texas Beef Council statistics while the rancher's expenses have continued to increase and the packer and retailer portions of the beef dollar, taken as a percentage of gross beef revenue, have continued to rise during this same period based on industry reporting,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that cattle producers, who are the major financial contributors of the Beef Checkoff funds, should be the ultimate income beneficiaries of increased beef demand spurred by Checkoff dollars.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that deficiencies in the present system need to be addressed and ICA believes that the Beef Checkoff program would be much more effective and result in a greater return to the producer if the following recommendations were instituted:

1. Create a Checkoff program utilizing a proportionate share of all Beef Checkoff monies, collected from the sale of United States born and raised cattle, being used to promote only U.S. born and raised beef;
2. Allow producers the opportunity to petition for a referendum every five years to decide whether the Checkoff should continue, and whether any changes should be made to the assessment. Prior to such a pending referendum, a third-party, unbiased analysis would be conducted to measure the effectiveness of the Checkoff program;
3. Require that the opportunity to contract for Beef Checkoff dollars be open to all contractors to allow for increased competitiveness in the bidding process;
4. Require that the Cattlemen's Beef Board and the Federation of State Beef Councils operate as separate and distinct entities, apart from all policy driven organizations, and that contracting entities not be allowed the appearance or the opportunity to influence the administration or decisions of the Cattlemen's Beef Board or the Federation of State Beef Councils.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas supports the results of the producer poll conducted for the Cattlemen's Beef Board by Gallop in which producers expressed support of continuation of the Checkoff and the desired areas of change and improvement, and

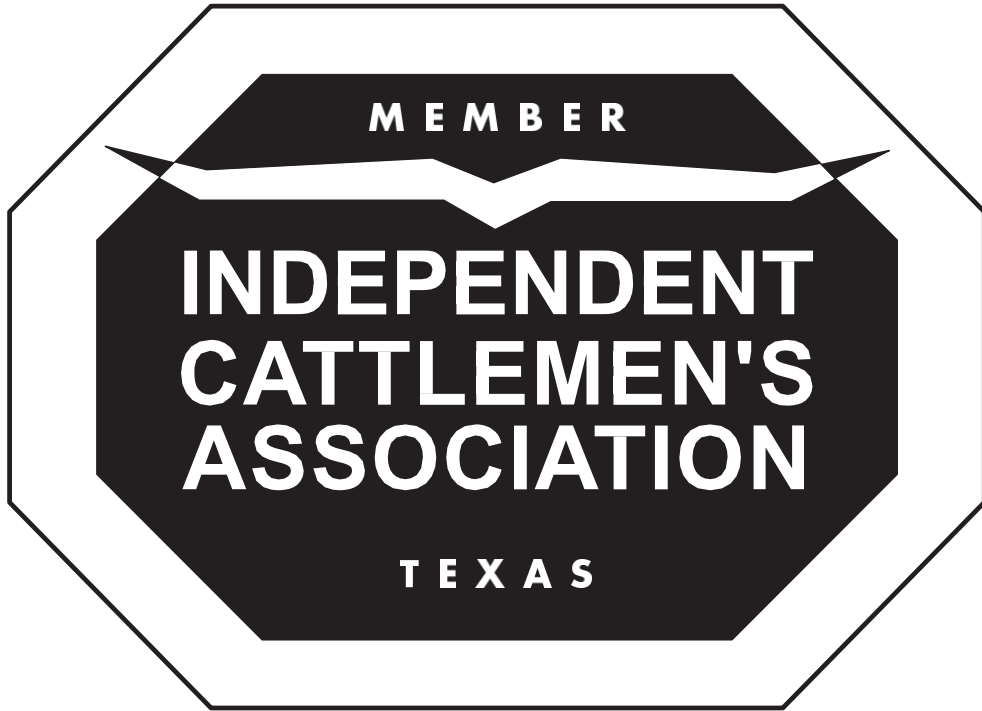

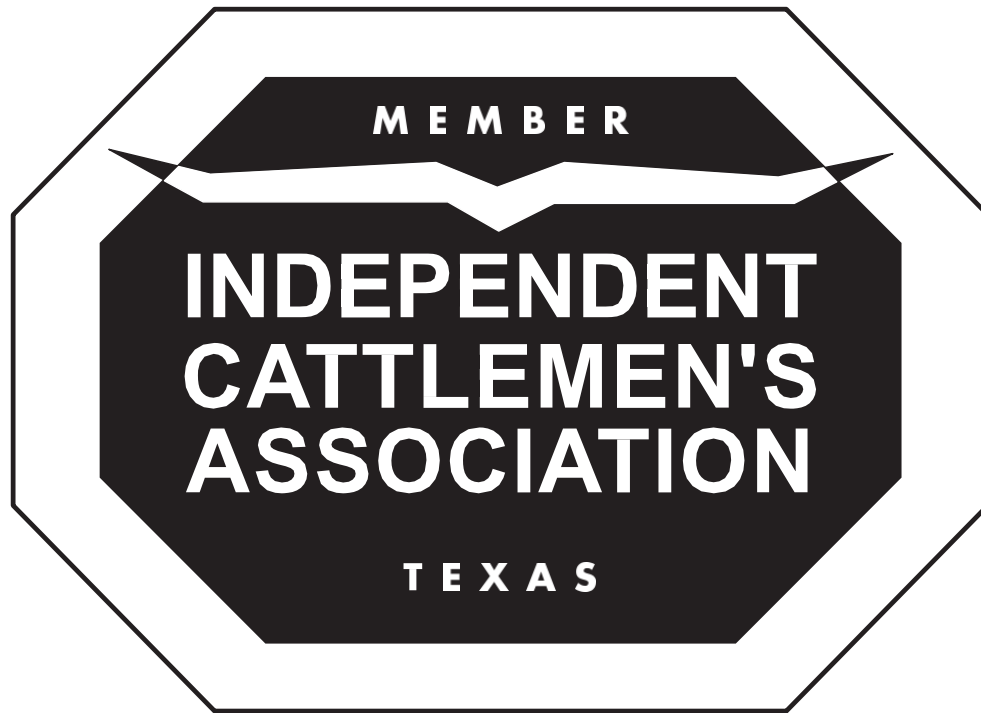

Eminent Domain

WHEREAS, the exercise of the power of eminent domain by government or by private entities providing a public service is the most extreme infringement on the private property rights of individual landowners that is allowed by the constitutions and laws of the United States of America and the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Fifth Amendment to the United States Constitution provides protection for the rights of individuals in and to their private property by prohibiting the taking of private property without just compensation; and

WHEREAS, the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution requires that the rights of all individuals and landowners be protected by requiring government and its agencies, as well as private entities providing a public service, to respect their right to due process under the law; and

WHEREAS, there are three main tenets of eminent domain reform: a good faith offer by the taking entity; compensation, including diminished access; and a clear definition of public use,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) believes that the power of eminent domain, also known as the power to condemn, should be exercised only when clearly necessary to achieve a justifiable public purpose and in the most extreme and rarest of circumstances and that landowners' rights to due process and against takings, of any manner, including partial takings, without just compensation must be protected at all times under all circumstances.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas supports a constitutional amendment that narrowly defines legitimate public use and prohibits the use of eminent domain for private and for profit economic development.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that with regard to truth in condemnation ICA believes:

- a. actual usage stated in condemnation must be followed
- b. Entities employing condemnation should be required to pay all fees the landowner incurs in challenging unfair offers.
- c. Negotiations need to take place before the entity claiming eminent domain should be allowed to set foot on property.
- d. A rule that allows property owner to buy back condemned property at the price he received if the condemned property has not been developed at the end of ten years should be implemented.
- e. The state should maintain a list of entities that are qualified and have the authority to use eminent domain to condemn private property. Registration should be with the Texas Attorney General and private entities should be bonded.

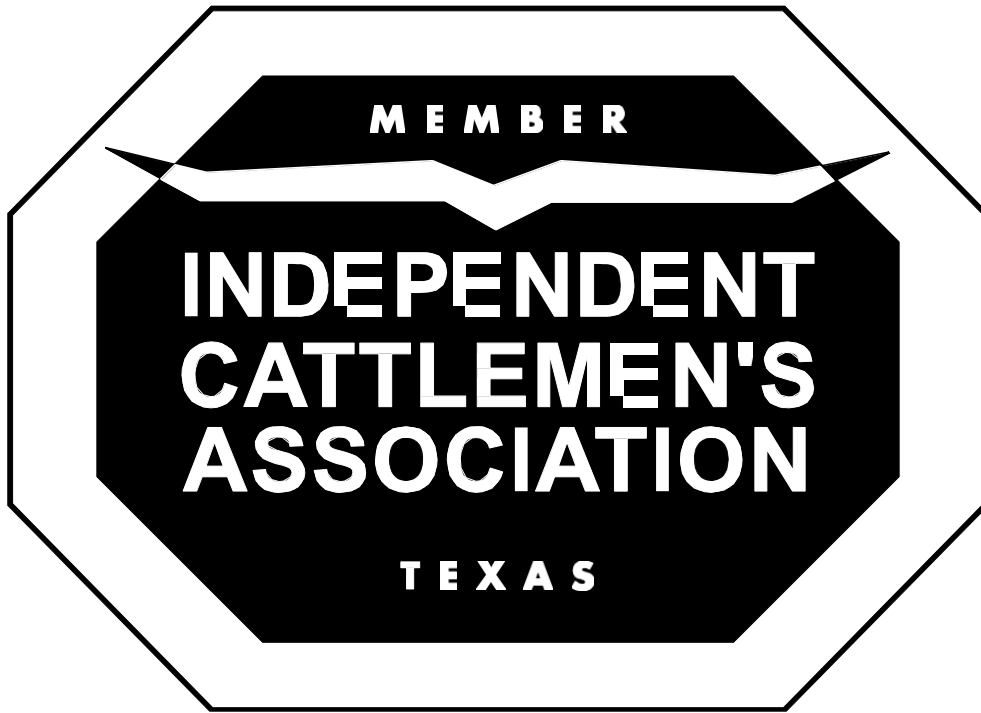

- Identify and ensure that orphan wells are located and secured
- Monitor the financial solvency of all operators
- Establish protocols for wells given to landowners as water wells to ensure proper plugging
- Establish protocols to develop systems for location of and well records
- Increase the fee structure and bonding requirements to cover the cost to plug orphaned well inventory
- Fully fund the plugging and abandonment of all orphaned and p13 wells.

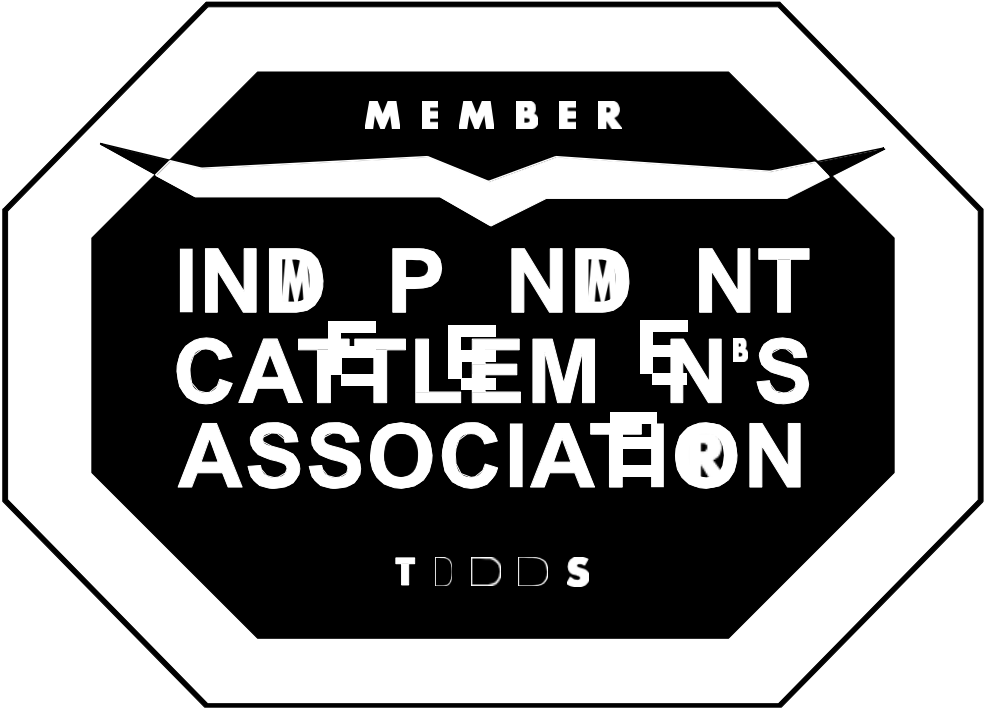

The United States Department of Agriculture and BSE Testing

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has been dilatory in enforcing its own requirements to safeguard US beef from BSE (a brain wasting disease), and it has admitted that “we anticipate that we may find a few additional cows” and that in April 2004 in a West Texas facility a USDA Supervisor waived the test for a downer cow, and the Secretary of Agriculture, Ann Veneman, now admits “we should have tested the cow”; and

WHEREAS, USDA has also violated its own regulations last year by allowing American Meat Packers to import thirty three million pounds of processed and ground beef from Canada and then admitted “clearly the process and our failure to announce some of these actions were flawed” (Ron Dehaven, USDA Chief Veterinary Officer); and

WHEREAS, at this moment infectious material from cows can legally be fed back to cows via the blood exemption, and that the Food and Drug Administration, realizing this has proposed a ban on the use of mammalian and poultry litter in cattle feed; and

WHEREAS, the USDA has attempted to justify its position on “science” even though the scientific community does not agree, and that there are many unknowns and gaps in our knowledge about BSE and all prion diseases, and because there is not sufficient science to guide our government and our cattle support groups, the risk assessments made by the USDA are solely dependent on imperfect and inaccurate data at this time,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports the following:

1. Public hearing be held on any changes in BSE policies and give consumers and public health experts the opportunity to comment on the USDA’s August 2003 decision to relax BSE protection.
2. That the USDA works with Canada to determine the actual prevalence of BSE in the Canadian cattle herds.
3. That the USDA should jointly commission the risk assessment with the Department of Health and Human Services.
4. That the USDA and the FDA include experts on both animal and human diseases.
5. That the Institute of Medicine and/or the National Academy of Science be included in such risk assessment along with other agencies.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ICA urges continued priority examination of LMNS in an effort to better serve the cattle industry. By allocating more available resources to reporting retail meat sales, boxed beef sales, direct fed cattle sales, electronic sales and feeder cattle sales, etc. the LMNS will better meet the needs of a dynamic cattle industry.

**Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and United
States Fish and Wildlife Service Data Collection
Program**

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas is opposed to the above mentioned agreement or any similar agreement and supports efforts to end this Federal/State relationship.

Underinsured Homeowners

WHEREAS, many insurance companies have contracts containing clauses stating if a dwellings replacement cost is more than 20 percent of the insured value and a loss is incurred by the policy holder, the insurance company can utilize a formula to adjust the replacement cost at approximately 60 percent of actual cost; and

WHEREAS, insurance companies are not mandated to inform the policy holder that a dwelling is underinsured thus creating a potential situation where a home owner could be compensated at an amount far less than the actual replacement cost of a home,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Independent Cattlemen’s Association of Texas supports legislation requiring insurance companies to notify homeowners when their dwellings are insured for less than twenty percent of their actual replacement value.

**Opposition to the American Heritage Rivers
Initiative**
